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


Phil Hanley SPELLBOUND My Life as a Dyslexic Wordsmith

An A-list comedian tells the story of his unlikely path to success while struggling with severe dyslexia.

When Phil Hanley entered first grade, he realized something that would forever set him apart from his peers: he couldn't read. His teachers were ill-equipped to assist him. His school system lacked the proper resources. For years, Phil slipped through the school's cracks, falling farther and farther behind his friends, only passing his grades because of his mother's interventions. Finally he was diagnosed with dyslexia, a learning disability that would shape the rest of his life.

In **SPELLBOUND**, Phil Hanley shares his experience living with extreme dyslexia. Unable to pursue college or a conventional job, Phil was thrust into a life that was defined by unconventional twists. He moved to Europe and became a successful runway model, a job that suited his lack of writing and

reading requirements. When that career flamed out, Phil retreated home to his parents where, eager to cure himself of his dyslexia, he found an all-consuming obsession with Transcendental Meditation. Finally, he found himself on a stage with a microphone, a spotlight, and five minutes of jokes. Though stand-up was never his dream, the comedy community provided a path that at the time seemed to be the only option left for him, and one that arguably, saved his life. **SPELLBOUND** is a story of humor and also of struggle and heartbreak, of constantly living in a world that sees things differently than you, and of triumph over adversity.

Phil Hanley's comedy career began at open mics in Vancouver, Canada. His Comedy Central special "The Half Hour" premiered November 14, 2015. He has performed on *The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon*, Late Night with Seth Meyers, The Late Late Show With Craig Ferguson, The Pete Holmes Show, John Oliver's New York Stand-Up Show, and @midnight. He has been showcased at every major comedy festival and can be seen regularly at The Comedy Cellar in New York City.

A lusciously illustrated graphic memoir-in-essays interweaving critical research and personal experience to examine the in-betweenness of being mixed-race Asian American and the cultural confrontations inherent to forging one's identity.

Weaving cultural history, linguistics, and cutting edge scholarship alongside her own childhood memories, Leise Hook gracefully navigates moments of racial in-betweenness that she experiences from Tokyo to Beijing, rural Thailand to the suburbs of Northern Virginia, and her current home, New York City. Each chapter poses a question about how we construct biracial identity.

A salient, heartrending cross between Cathy Park Hong's *Minor Feelings* and Gene Luen Yang's *American Born Chinese*, Leise Hook's graphic memoir is a kaleidoscopic work about the influence of the outside gaze and the opposite, enduring power we have to construct our own identities.

Leise Hook is an Asian American cartoonist and illustrator currently based in Stockholm, Sweden. Her work has appeared in the *Believer*, the *New Yorker*, and *Catapult*, and has been shortlisted for a National Magazine Award for Digital Storytelling and for the Cartoonist Studio Prize. She received the Electronic Literature Organization's 2021 Robert Coover Award for a Work of Electronic Literature. Hook grew up in Virginia and Michigan, and previously worked in art museums in NYC and Beijing, China. She is a graduate of the MFA program at the Center for Cartoon Studies in Vermont.

THE FORGOTTEN MILLION

The Slaves of the Renaissance

The conventional view of the Renaissance is of an era in which Europeans cast off the intellectual shackles that had constrained them in Medieval times, embracing the art and rational philosophy of ancient Greece and Rome, and constructing a culture centered around a new appreciation of the dignity and importance of the individual. Yet, in Florence, the city that was at the very heart of Europe's cultural revival and in many parts of the continent, it was perfectly legal and socially acceptable for some of the inhabitants to belong to others.

Combining travel writing and academic detective work, **THE FORGOTTEN MILLION** tells the story of the million or more people enslaved in the countries fringing the Mediterranean Sea before the start of the Atlantic slave trade, showing the role that slaves played in Renaissance society and forcing us to rethink our most cherished beliefs about Europe's cultural rebirth. It shows the extent to which the importation of free, enslaved labor helped southern Europe to recover economically from the Black Death in the 14th century and, in so doing, enable the full flowering of the Renaissance, and explores whether southern Europe's dependence on slave labor played a role alongside religion in holding back the spread of an entrepreneurial spirit that was already beginning to infuse the north and ultimately facilitated the Industrial Revolution. Further, the southern Europeans who first encountered, conquered and settled the Americas approached the enterprise with a mentality shaped by centuries in which bondage had been economically advantageous, socially permissible and theologically legitimized. This was true, not only of the Spanish and Portuguese, but also of the Italians who played a pivotal role, not just in the discovery of the Americas, but in the implantation of slavery there.

A work of vivid narrative and profound historical inquiry, **THE FORGOTTEN MILLION** will restore to its rightful centrality a truth that has long been dismissed as incidental to Europe's history. This is a book that will irrevocably transform our understanding of Europe's most celebrated era.

John Hooper is a prize-winning author and foreign correspondent who has spent most of his adult life living in, and writing about, the countries that are the subject of this book. He is currently the Italy and Vatican Correspondent of *The Economist* and an honorary fellow of St. Catharine's College, University of Cambridge. From 2016 to 2022, he was a Stanford University lecturer, teaching at the university's campus in Florence. He is the author of the national bestseller *The Italians* (Viking/Penguin, 2016), and *The Spaniards* (Penguin, 1994 and 2006)), which won the Allen Lane Award for a best first work of history or literature. Over the course of a long career in journalism, Hooper has worked for, among others, the *Guardian*, the *Observer*, the *BBC*, *Reuters* and *NBC*. He has also contributed to the *New York Times*, the *Wall Street Journal* and many other publications. He knows five languages and has covered various conflicts including in Northern Ireland, the Middle East, Algeria, Kosovo and Afghanistan. The author was educated at the University of Cambridge and graduated with an honors degree in history.

Blending memoir and cultural criticism, Giaae Kwon explores how her love affair with K-Pop shaped her sense of self. **I'LL LOVE YOU FOREVER**, charts K-pop's complex history through idols like BLACKPINK, H.O.T., Taeyeon, IU, Suga from BTS, and shows how they illuminated and informed her own life. The collection is an expansion of Kwon's column "From a K-Pop Fan, With Love" at *Catapult*.

The essays center personal experience from the perspective of a bilingual and bicultural Korean American in order to explore larger cultural topics. **I'LL LOVE YOU FOREVER** breaks new ground in its consideration of K-Pop, bridging the gap between criticism and the personal to span the history of K-Pop from its origins to the present. Weaving longer essays, which center

personal narrative, with interspersed micro essays about key happenings in K-Pop, Kwon profiles different idols with such themes as Korea's obsession with academics (Tablo from Epik High), plastic surgery (Park Bom), and female sexuality and desire (Gain), amongst others, providing readers with a fuller picture of a culturally and socially complex industry.

Giaae Kwon is a food and culture writer whose writing has appeared in *The Rumpus, Electric Literature, BuzzFeed Reader,* and *Taste.* She wrote a column about K-Pop for *Catapult.* She attended the Tin House Summer Workshop, and her essay on Momofuku Kāwi was a Notable Mention in *Best American Food Writing 2020.* She writes the newsletter, *I Love You, Egg,* and lives in Brooklyn, where she's working on her next project in which she explores Korean food through the lens of the diaspora.

For readers of Kiese Laymon's *Heavy*, *Punch Me Up to The Gods* and Hanif Abdurraqib's *A Little Devil in America*, a beautiful, painful, and soaring tribute to everything that Black men are and can be.

Growing up in the Bronx, Joél Leon was taught that being soft, being vulnerable, could end your life. Shaped by a singular view of Black masculinity espoused by the media, by family and friends, and by society, he learned instead to care about the gold around his neck and the number of bills in his wallet. He absorbed the "facts" that White was always right and Black men were seen as threatening or great for comic relief, but never worthy of the opening credits. It wasn't until years later that Joél understood he didn't have to be defined by these things.

Now, in a collection of wide-ranging essays, he takes readers from his upbringing in the Bronx to his life raising two little girls of his own, unraveling

those narratives to arrive at a deeper understanding of who he is as a son, friend, partner, and father. Traversing both the serious and lighthearted, from contemplating male beauty standards and his belly, to his decision to seek therapy, to the difficulties of making co-parenting work, Joél cracks open his heart to reveal his multitudes.

Crafted like an album, each essay is a single that stands alone yet reverberates throughout the entire collection. Pieces like "How to Make a Black Friend" consider challenging, delightful and absurd moments in relationships, while others like "Sensitive Thugs All Need Hugs" and "All Gold Everything" ponder the collective harms of society's lens. With incisive, searing prose, **EVERYTHING AND NOTHING AT ONCE** deconstructs what it means to be a Black man in America.

Joél Leon, also known as Joél L. Daniels., is a performer and storyteller from the Bronx. Currently, he's a creative director at the *New York Times*' T Brand Studio. Joél specializes in leading conversations surrounding race, masculinity, mental health, and the performing arts. His TED Talk on healthy co-parenting has been viewed more than 1.6 million times. 

A genre-bending work of journalism and memoir by award-winning writer Tracie McMillan tallies the cash benefit—and cost—of racism in America.

In **THE WHITE BONUS**, McMillan asks a provocative question about racism in America: When people of color are denied so much, what are White people given? And how much is it worth—not in amorphous privilege, but in dollars and cents?

McMillan begins with three generations of her family, tracking their modest wealth to its roots: American policy that helped Whites first. Simultaneously, she details the complexities of their advantage, exploring her mother's death in a nursing home, at 44, on Medicaid; her family's implosion; and a small inheritance from a banker grandfather. In the process, McMillan puts a cash value to Whiteness in her life and assesses its worth.

McMillan then expands her investigation to four other White subjects of different generations across the U.S. Alternating between these subjects and her family, McMillan shows how, and to what degree, racial privilege begets material advantage across class, time, and place.

For readers of Robin DiAngelo's White Fragility and Heather McGhee's The Sum of Us, McMillan brings groundbreaking insight on the White working class. And for readers of Tara Westover's Educated and Kiese Laymon's Heavy, McMillan reckons intimately with the connection between the abuse we endure at home and the abuse America allows in public.

Raised in rural Michigan, Detroit- and Brooklyn-based writer **Tracie McMillan** has written for publications including the *New York Times, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Mother Jones, Harper's Magazine, Slate,* and *National Geographic.* After putting herself through New York University and training under legendary reporter Wayne Barrett, she was the managing editor of the award-winning magazine *City Limits* from 2001 to 2005. A one-time target of Rush Limbaugh and a 2012-13 Knight-Wallace Journalism Fellow, McMillan is also the author of the bestselling *The American Way of Eating* (Scribner, 2012). McMillan's work has been recognized by the Sidney Hillman Book Prize, the James Beard Foundation Journalism Awards, and Investigative Reporters and Editors, among others.



Victoria's Secret and the Unraveling of an American Icon

The story of how Victoria's Secret skyrocketed from a tiny chain of boutiques to an intimates monolith with annual sales in excess of \$6 billion—all the while defining female beauty and sex standards for generations of women—and how the brand's grip on the industry slipped.

Victoria's Secret is one of the most influential, and polarizing, brands to ever infiltrate the psyche of the American consumer. The company's catalog made national headlines in the '70s for its glamorization of lingeries. By 1984, the owners were forced to sell to Columbus retail magnate Les Wexner, who was swiftly building an empire that would shape retail as we knew it for the next 40 years. Just a decade later, Victoria's Secret was a billion-dollar brand, selling the majority of bras bought in the U.S. It helped to define what it meant to look like a happy, successful—and most importantly, sexy—modern woman to a whole generation of consumers across the globe through its airbrushed advertisements, pink velvet-lined stores, and annual televised fashion show,

which drew in millions of viewers each year. But as culture changed, Victoria's Secret did not change with it. Not only did the company miss out on big expansion opportunities, it also refused to change its marketing as the world became less obsessed with thinness and perfection, and more keenly focused on body acceptance. Meanwhile, Wexner, the mastermind, became increasingly known for his complicated relationship with sex trafficker Jeffrey Epstein, whose lifestyle he funded for many years. In March 2021, with his legacy in peril, Wexner and his wife Abigail stepped down from the Victoria's Secret board as he faced investigation by the FBI. Today, Victoria's Secret is trying to rebuild its reputation—and maintain the still-significant grip it has on the consumer. **SELLING SEXY** expertly draws from sources within the company and across the fashion industry to examine: What happens now to a brand with such a heavy history?





CHARLES SUMNER Conscience of a Nation

A landmark biography of Charles Sumner, the unsung hero of the American Civil War and Reconstruction.

Known mainly as the abolitionist senator brutally caned within an inch of his life by slaveholder Preston Brooks on the Senate floor in 1856, Charles Sumner also played a pivotal role in advancing democracy and shaping the Constitution during Reconstruction, America's "Second Founding." During the Civil War, Sumner convinced Lincoln to emancipate the South's slaves; stopped England from joining the conflict; and created the Freedmen's Bureau. After the war, Sumner transformed America by authoring the Fourteenth Amendment and thereby embedding his slogan—"equality before the law"—into the Constitution. Sumner was a martyr-like senator who put principles above politics at every turn.

In **CHARLES SUMNER**, Zaakir Tameez shows how this overlooked luminary is one of the most significant figures in the history of civil rights, as well as a visionary progenitor of modern progressive politics. He focuses on Sumner's passionate struggle to end slavery, promote civil rights, and redeem the Constitution, and considers how his emphasis on the Constitution as a vehicle for the promotion of human rights—rather than simply the protection of individual liberty—was a radical interpretation that anticipated much contemporary progressive jurisprudence. The book also looks at Sumner's social milieu, which included an extraordinary range of prominent thinkers and writers, from Ralph Waldo Emerson to Henry Longfellow to Frederick Douglass. Finally, it is the first biography to identify Sumner as a gay man who struggled with his sexuality, and as a committed white ally who had deep relationships with Black community leaders.

Eminently readable and meticulously researched, **CHARLES SUMNER** promises to be a groundbreaking intervention in the field of constitutional law and an authoritative biography of this major American figure.

Zaakir Tameez is an emerging scholar of antitrust and constitutional law. A graduate of Yale Law School, he was an editor on the Yale Law Journal and has published multiple law review articles. He also holds degrees from the University of Virginia, where he was a Lawn Resident and Posse Scholar, and Queen Mary University of London, where he studied on a Fulbright Scholarship. In 2025, he will be clerking for Judge Jill Pryor of the 11th Circuit. He is from Houston, Texas.

When Ali Azeem, a naïve Muslim bachelor from Mumbai, agrees to a traditional arranged marriage with pretty, staid, Maryam Khan, he thinks he has hit the jackpot: Maryam is the daughter of Abbas Khan, a self-made real-estate tycoon and one of the richest men in New York City. But shortly after Ali moves to America—where he's being groomed to take over the Khan's real-estate empire—he receives a warning from Maryam's older sister, Farhan, a mercurial divorcee who casts a seductive spell over Ali: Farhan claims Abbas Khan is an amoral monster, and a dark secret lies at the heart of his accomplishments.

But can Farhan be trusted? She is the black sheep of the family, and according to Maryam, an unstable liar. Unsure which sister to believe, Ali launches his own amateur investigation into the Khans and quickly discovers a disconcerting connection between the family and the Jackson Heights Serial Killer—who may still be out there.

Before Ali commits to taking over Abbas's role in the family business, he struggles to determine who the Khans really are: The embodiment of the American dream—or a bona fide nightmare? As allegiances shift and facades crumble, Ali is forced to question everything he believes about family and loyalty—and when the truth is finally revealed, Ali must ask himself if he can pay the dark price of success.

Exploring themes of immigrant success, family secrets, and the power of the one percent—A KILLER IN THE FAMILY is a riveting and smart page-turner that will keep you wondering "just who is the killer in the family?" right up to its stunning conclusion.



An exhilarating debut novel about a child whose literal enlightenment sets the stage for an exuberant tragicomedy of marriage, religion, and parenthood.

On an otherwise ordinary fall day on a university campus in Chicago, the toddler son of an ambitious divinity school professor named Adrian Bennett mysteriously starts to glow. The nimbus, as the strange, soft light comes to be known, offers no clues to its origin and frustrates every attempt at rational explanation.

Though the nimbus appears only intermittently, and not to everyone, the otherworldly glow quickly upends the lives of all those who encounter it, including Paul Harkin, Adrian's broke and feckless graduate student, who likes being a graduate student a little too much for his own good; Renata Bennett, Adrian's omnicompetent wife, who can't see her son glowing even though the nimbus is turning her life upside down; and Warren Kayita, a down-on-his-luck

librarian and aging div school alumnus on the run from a violent criminal. As news about the nimbus spreads around the university and beyond, Adrian, Paul, Renata, and Warren are set on a collision course that will threaten their lives and put their deepest convictions to the test.

MASS MOTHERING follows an amateur translator in an unnamed city as she encounters the stories of a community of mothers who gather to publicly mourn their disappeared sons. Haunting and humane, it illuminates the mutuality of grief, the ambiguity of violence in a globalized world, and the radical, life-affirming virtue of testimony.

A. is an amateur translator living alone in an unforgiving, late-capitalist metropolis. Adrift and hounded by debt after a rare diagnosis results in a sudden hysterectomy, she spends her days caring for a young boy who is not, and could never be, her own. In the evenings, to forget herself as much as to more fully occupy her newly failing body, she goes dancing at a regular rotation of bars that offer live music for cheap covers. Most nights on the dancefloor, she encounters N., an immigrant who shares both her haunted state and, sometimes, her bed.

Among N.'s meager possessions, A. discovers a small book about a city of missing boys. Unfinished at the time of its author's death and titled simply, *Field Notes*, the book records the testimonies of a community of mothers who gather to publicly mourn their disappeared sons. A. becomes transfixed by the collective chorus of the mothers' primal grief, preternatural strength, and intuitive care for one another. When a near-assault stuns A. out of her circumscribed existence, she travels to the conflict-ridden, faraway city where *Field Notes* was written in search of answers. The further A. looks for its author, the more she discovers traces of a murdered female poet whose mysterious legacy may lead to deeper truths.

Sarah Bruni writes with the ethical and philosophical intelligence of Katie Kitamura, the mesmerizing imagination of Mohsin Hamid, and the spare electricity of Jenny Offill, as she deftly constructs a layered story of astonishing formal invention and indelible poignancy. **MASS MOTHERING** captivates with questions of cause and complicity, only to then subvert those expectations and reveal what matters most in the end: the awesome, world-bending force of a mother's love.

Sarah Bruni is a writer, educator, editor, and translator. She holds an MFA in Fiction Writing from Washington University in St. Louis and an MA in Latin American Studies from Tulane University. She is the author of the novel *The Night Gwen Stacy Died*, which was published by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt in 2013 and described as "witty, observant and hypnotic" by the *New York Times* and "superbly suspenseful" by *Kirkus* in a starred review, with *Bookforum* saying, "Bruni's book superbly explores the part fiction plays in our search for identity." 





And the youngest, Maggie, is finally taking the risk of bringing a woman she loves home to her Irish Catholic mother, at the same time deeply regretting her recent reunion with her ex. Infusing everything is the grief for Topher that none of the Ryans have figured out how to carry together instead of separately.

When Cait invites Luke to Thanksgiving dinner, old tensions boil over and new truths surface, nearly overpowering the flickering light of their family bond. Far more than a family holiday will be ruined unless the sisters can find a way to forgive themselves-and each other.

In December 2008, when Israeli forces launched Operation Cast Lead, Palestinians in the Gaza Strip thought they knew what to expect. Breaking the Silence, a group of Israeli veterans dedicated to exposing the truth of their country's actions, traces the evolution of this strategy over the years, in which the Gaza Strip is treated as an independent hostile state with an enemy army and a conventional battlefield free of civilians. It probes Israel's purpose in projecting a fiction of symmetrical war, and how this ultimately served its goal of maintaining control over Palestinians and fragmenting their territory. Unveiling this fiction is at the heart of this book: what it involves, how it has been sustained, and, crucially, how it has allowed Israel to ignore the reality of unfathomable human loss.

Drawing on soldiers' testimonies, Palestinian accounts, and IDF publications, **THE WARS BEFORE THE WAR** offers an unprecedented high-resolution view of how and why Israel has wreaked havoc on Gaza. Gripping and revelatory, it is essential reading for all those concerned with human rights, global politics, and the future of Israel and Palestine, at once a landmark investigation and a shocking chronicle of a catastrophe foretold.

Breaking the Silence is an organization of veteran soldiers who have served in the Israeli military and are committed to exposing the reality of life in the Occupied Palestinian Territories. 

In the mid-1970s, Muhammad Yunus, an American-trained Bangladeshi economist, met a poor female stool maker who needed money to expand her business. In an act known as the beginning of microfinance, Yunus lent \$27 to 42 women, hoping small credit would help them to pull themselves out of poverty. Soon, Yunus's Grameen Bank was born, and very small, often high-interest loans for poor people took off. In 2006, Yunus and the Grameen Bank won the Nobel Peace Prize "for...creat[ing] economic and social development from below."

But there's a problem with this story. There are mounting concerns that these small loans are as likely to bury poor people in debt as they are to pull them from poverty, with borrowers from India to Kenya facing consequences such as

jail time and forced land sales. Hundreds have even reportedly committed suicide. What happened? Did microfinance take a wrong turn, or was microfinance flawed from the beginning?

WE ARE NOT ABLE TO LIVE IN THE SKY is a story about unintended consequences, blind optimism, and the decades-long ramifications of seemingly small policy choices, rooted in the stories of women borrowers in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Their narratives are set against the rise of Yunus's vision explored through a deep history of modern international development. Kardas-Nelson asks: What is missed with a single, financially-focused solution to global inequity that ignores the real drivers of poverty? Who stands to benefit and, more important, who gets left behind?

Mara Kardas-Nelson is an independent journalist focusing on international development and inequality. Her award-winning work has appeared in the *New York Times*, the *Nation*, NPR, the *Guardian* and elsewhere. Mara has also spent years working in global health. Originally from the U.S., she has also lived in Canada, South Africa and Sierra Leone. Her time in different parts of the world informs the questions she asks, and how she frames her stories.

If you've ever heard the phrase "The revolution will not be televised" then you've heard the words of Gil Scott-Heron, the legendary jazz musician, poet, activist and author. Sometimes called "The Godfather of Rap" or even the "Black Bob Dylan," neither sobriquet gets at the true legacy of the brilliant, complicated, and infamous artist who touched everything from poetry to music to politics to literature.

Drawing on never-before-seen letters, diaries, and personal papers, **THE FIRST MINUTE OF A NEW DAY** will be the first definitive biography of Scott-Heron, with a publication in 2024 to coincide with the 75th anniversary of his birth. The book will cover the vast reach of his political, cultural, and musical influence; the turbulent story of Washington, D.C., in the 1970s and its meaning for Black power and society for decades to follow; Scott-Heron's place in Black nationalism; and most of all, the impact of his work, which lives on in just about every cultural medium imaginable.

Gil Scott-Heron is overdue for a restoration to his place in history and recognition for his acute relevance to our times (which is not to discount his existing followers—his work is downloaded by a million monthly listeners on Spotify). Giovanni Russonello is the only writer with the expertise to engage with the life of Gil Scott-Heron. With one foot deep in the world of jazz, and the other even deeper in politics, he has the rare authority and ability to write what will be a classic, award-winning biography.

Giovanni Russonello is a writer, organizer and educator who is the only person to serve simultaneously as a music critic and political columnist for the *New York Times*. He currently covers jazz and experimental music for the *Times*, while also reaching more than a million subscribers each day as the lead writer of the "On Politics" newsletter. For the past 11 years he has been the president and co-founder of CapitalBop, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that promotes, presents and preserves jazz in Washington, D.C., as a means of building community in a city riven by the impact of gentrification. He spent years as a talk-radio host on the local "jazz and justice" radio station, WPFW 89.3 FM. He teaches writing part-time at New York University's School of Professional Studies, and is a 2021 fellow in the Logan Nonfiction Program.





Darrin Bell was six years old when his mother told him he couldn't have a realistic water gun. She said she feared for his safety, that police tend to think of little Black boys as older and less innocent than they really are.

Through evocative illustrations and sharp humor, Bell examines how The Talk shaped intimate and public moments from childhood to adulthood. While coming of age in Los Angeles—and finding a voice through cartooning—Bell becomes painfully aware of being regarded as dangerous by White teachers, neighbors, and police officers, and thus of his mortality. Drawing attention to the brutal murders of African Americans and showcasing revealing insights and cartoons along the way, he brings us up to the moment of reckoning when people took to the streets protesting the murders of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor. And now Bell must decide whether he and his own six-year-old son are ready to have The Talk.

Darrin Bell, recipient of the 2019 Pulitzer Prize for Editorial Cartooning, the 2016 Berryman Award for Editorial Cartooning, the 2015 RFK Award for Editorial Cartooning, and UC Berkeley's 2015 Daily Californian Alumni of the Year Award, began his career in 1995 at the age of twenty. While serving as the Daily Californian's staff cartoonist, he began freelancing for the Opinion pages of the Los Angeles Times, San Francisco Chronicle, and Oakland Tribune. In 1997, he co-created the comic strip Rudy Park and self-syndicated it to technology magazines. United Media launched it into newspapers in 2001. In 2003, Darrin launched his other comic strip, Candorville, in newspapers via the Washington Post Writers Group (WPWG), which also began syndicating his editorial cartoons in 2013. While WPWG still syndicates Candorville and Rudy Park, Darrin moved his editorial cartoons to King Features Syndicate in late 2018. He's also a contributing cartoonist for the New Yorker. Darrin lives with his wife and four children in California.



As it's usually told, the story of the German Jews starts at the end, with their tragic demise in Hitler's Third Reich. Now, in this important work of historical restoration, Amos Elon takes us back to the beginning, chronicling a period of achievement and integration that at its peak produced a golden age second only to the Renaissance.

Writing with a novelist's eye, Elon shows how a persecuted clan of cattle dealers and wandering peddlers was transformed into a stunningly successful community of writers, philosophers, scientists, tycoons, and activists. He peoples his account with dramatic figures: Moses Mendelssohn, who entered Berlin in 1743 through the gate reserved for Jews and cattle, and went on to

become "the German Socrates"; Heinrich Heine, beloved lyric poet who famously referred to baptism as the admission ticket to European culture; Hannah Arendt, whose flight from Berlin signaled the end of the German-Jewish idyll. Elon traces how this minority—never more than one percent of the population—came to be perceived as a deadly threat to national integrity, and he movingly demonstrates that this devastating outcome was uncertain almost until the end.

A collective biography, full of depth and compassion, **THE PITY OF IT ALL** summons up a splendid world and a dream of integration and tolerance that, despite all, remains the essential ennobling project of modernity.





He was a German Jew who fled the Nazi regime and settled in the United States. He was one of the founders of The William Alanson White Institute of Psychiatry, Psychoanalysis and Psychology in New York City and was associated with the Frankfurt School of critical theory. He died in 1980.

Scattered over the territory between the Jordan River and the Mediterranean Sea lie the remnants of failed peace proposals, international summits, secret negotiations, UN resolutions, and state-building efforts. The conventional story is that these well-meaning attempts at peacemaking were repeatedly, perhaps terminally, thwarted by the use of violence.

Through a rich interweaving of reportage, historical narrative, and forceful analysis, Nathan Thrall presents a startling counter-history. He shows that Israelis and Palestinians have persistently been marching toward partition, but not through the high politics of diplomacy or the incremental building of a Palestinian state. In fact, negotiation, collaboration, and state-building—the prescription of successive American administrations—have paradoxically entrenched the conflict in multiple ways. They have created the illusion that a solution is at hand, lessened Israel's incentives to end its control over the West

Bank and Gaza, and undermined Palestinian unity. Ultimately, it is those who have embraced confrontation through boycotts, lawsuits, resolutions imposed by outside powers, protests, civil disobedience, and even violence who have brought about the most significant change.

Published as Israel's occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza reaches its fiftieth year, which is also the centenary of the Balfour Declaration that first promised a Jewish national home in Palestine, *The Only Language They Understand* advances a bold thesis that shatters ingrained positions of both left and right and provides a new and eve-opening understanding of this most vexed of lands.

Nathan Thrall is the author of *The Only Language They Understand: Forcing Compromise in Israel and Palestine*. His essays, reviews, and reported features have appeared in *The New York Times Magazine*, *The Guardian*, the *London Review of Books* and *The New York Review of Books* and have been translated into more than a dozen languages. He spent a decade at the International Crisis Group, where he was director of the Arab-Israeli Project, and has taught at Bard College. Originally from California, he lives in Jerusalem.
