After 15 years and 8 incredible installments in the Dave Gurney series—a global publishing phenomenon and international bestseller—John Verdon's THINK OF A NUMBER and subsequent books are finally in development with a major Television network as a continuing procedural series, with multiple producers attached. In the tricky Hollywood market, smart procedurals are one of the only growth spaces, and John's wonderful characters have capitalized on this moment.

Meanwhile, development on **THE RADIANT DARK**, a new novel by Alexandra Oliva (recently pre-empted by Sarah Jessica Parker's publishing imprint) has already made great strides in its development for television, with an award-winning duo of HBO showrunners now attached to spearhead the writing process.

Beloved writing pair **Karen Mack and Jennifer Kaufman** are back with a new novel that caused a bidding war among Television executives (publishing rights sold to William Morrow in an aggressive pre-empt) and has ultimately landed with Development M, a powerful studio led by Michael Schaefer (who was responsible for the recent TV remake of MR. AND MRS. SMITH) and Mike Larocca (EVERYTHING EVERYWHERE ALL AT ONCE). The novel, WELCOME TO VEGAS, was pitched as a sexy, suspenseful "Succession" set in the glittering, menacing city of Las Vegas.

Greg Marshall's laugh-out-loud memoir **LEG** is making great progress in its development as a television series, as a head writer is now attached and the production team is preparing to begin pitches to network executives with this writer's pitch. Stay tuned for further updates!

The Queen of funny feminist horror, **Rachel Harrison**, now has yet another novel in development as a feature film—her brilliantly layered story **BLACK SHEEP**. Both terrifying and wise, with dark humor and a finale you won't soon forget.



HONEY IN THE WOUND Jiyoung Han

Spanning ninety years as one Korean family's lives are upended under Japanese imperialism, HONEY IN THE WOUND is a powerful and sweeping debut novel for fans of *How Much of These Hills is Gold* and *Homegoing*.

A daughter disappears and returns as a tiger. A mother's voice compels those who hear it to speak only the truth. A granddaughter can see the dreams of others, revealing their deepestheld memories and desires.

Young-Ja struggles to survive after her family is killed by Japanese soldiers. The gift that once brought her comfort and joy—the ability to infuse her cooking with her feelings: love, peace, delight—transforms into something more complex as she encounters the ravages of colonialism and can't keep the tang of her sorrow from seeping into her confections. When her talent is noticed by a Korean resistance fighter, she's taken to Manchuria where she becomes enmeshed in a network of spies at a teahouse favored by Japanese officials.

NAMES HAVE BEEN CHANGED

R.F. Kuang's Yellowface meets Susie Yang's White Ivy in NAMES HAVE BEEN CHANGED; a stylish, fast-paced story about friendship, betrayal, and the masks we wear to survive.

Ophir isn't her real name, but she likes it fine for now, and if she's going to get through this story—the real story of her last 12 years on the run—she's going to do it on her own terms. This is what our narrator promises as she sets out to broadcast (with the help of a mysterious friend, from an undisclosed location) her tumultuous life as a fugitive, forever estranged from her home and family in Singapore, where it all began.

Entrancing her listeners with a tale that transports us from Thailand to Tokyo, and from London to America's Midwest, it is Ophir's loneliness and longing for connection that eventually jeopardizes her hard-won freedom.

NYMPH pairs *Call Me by Your Name* with the precise, elevated prose of Elena Ferrante. Sofia Montrone's debut revels in the exuberant highs and awkward lows of girlhood, set to the backdrop of rural Italy.

Leo spends her mornings tidying the rooms of her Nonna Tina's timeworn Italian agriturismo, carefully accumulating the curious left-behind detritus from guests—a pearl earring, a lock of hair. At night, she gathers the stories that flow from her father's lips—liquor-spun tales of Odysseus and the Trojans in secret battle. When an accident rips the gentle membrane of Leo's childhood, she is left vulnerable to the pains and pleasures of growing up.

Years later, in a sultry summer not unlike the many that came before, the agriturismo is the only thing that remains the same. Nonna Tina has grown older, Leo's brother Max is intractable and mercurial, and the curiosity Leo so loved to feed as a child has turned into something more confusing. When she meets Dolores, an American girl, she can't help but gather all the experiences first love promises, while shedding parts of the past she no longer fits into.
