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




We are thrilled to have a short story collection and a novel on the <u>2024 Giller Prize longlist</u>: **Caroline Adderson**'s *A Way to Be Happy: Stories* (p. 14), and **Loghan Paylor**'s *The Cure for Drowning* (p. 22). Congratulations to Caroline and Loghan, and to their hardworking publishers, Biblioasis and Random House Canada! Keep your eye out for the Giller Prize shortlist, to be announced on October 9, 2024.

And in other exciting news for these two books, A Way to Be Happy, which is the lead fiction






title for Biblioasis this fall, earned a starred review in *Kirkus*, which praised Adderson for her "gift for finding the tender parts in characters, even unlikable ones," and called her "a deft, masterful storyteller whose literary fiction surely deserves more attention." *The British Columbia Review* said: "Adderson expertly develops a detailed setting... That's what Adderson does best: placing her characters in unsettling situations and then introducing them to a variety of possibilities." Meanwhile, *The Cure for Drowning* landed on several CBC Books lists: "Writers to Watch: 30 Canadian writers making their mark in 2024", "35 books for Pride month", and "10 historical fiction books to transport you this summer". It was also featured on *LitHub*'s "Oh, Queer Canada: A Reading List for Americans in Search of LGBTQ Canadian History" and *The Miramichi Reader*'s *Pride month editor's picks* list. The *Vancouver Sun* called *The Cure for Drowning* "a stirring page-turner of a historical love story that delves into the meaning of family – both inherited and created." And *The Miramichi Reader* called it "A rich, beautifully wrought family saga about love, truth and identity... This is a deeply moving book, filled with historic detail, vividly drawn descriptions, and layered with haunting insights about family, loyalty and truth. ...Highly recommended."

What if K-Pop Stars Are Actually Just Like Us?

In the debut novel "The Band," a burned-out pop idol meets a disillusioned professor, raising the question: What if the dangers of fame resemble white-collar ennui?



With a slew of accolades and media attention, *The Band* by **Christine Ma-Kellams** (p. 19) has been everywhere this spring and summer. The New York Times Book Review handed down a rave, stating: "Christine Ma-Kellams's brief, thoughtful debut novel, The Band, explores these two ideas – K-pop as one more version of stardom; K-pop as something unique – while also posing new questions: What if K-pop stars, who work so hard to rise up and then inevitably tire out, actually resemble the rest of us? What if the dangers of fame resemble a more familiar white-collar ennui?" Booklist gave it a rave review as well: "Ma-Kellams takes readers on a gripping exploration of the complexities that accompany fame... [in t]his darkly humorous novel." Kirkus called the novel a scathing



indictment of... the way the industry often turns a blind eye to the mental health of its stars... A satirical examination of the stars and fans of the music industry." The Band also landed on <u>Debutiful</u>'s Most Anticipated Books of 2024 list with the following endorsement: "This could very well be the first great K-Pop literary phenomenon. Expect a stylized, pop culture romp." <u>People Magazine</u> selected it for its Best Books of April 2024 list, writing: "K-pop fans and readers who haven't yet fallen in with the phenomenon will both love this darkly funny novel about a troubled K-pop idol who disappears after he finds himself at the center of controversy, the discontented Chinese American woman who rescues him and the price of manufactured fame." Reuniting with Strangers by Jennilee Austria-Bonifacio was shortlisted for the Toronto Book Awards! The jury called it "a revelation." The novel, which follows the reunification of Filipino caregiver families over one Canadian winter – and the mysterious progress of Monolith, who appears and disappears in their lives – was included in the former mayor of Calgary Naheed Nenshi's list of six books to help build empathy; he called the author "a rare and powerful talent." Foreword Reviews gave it a starred review, saying: "Every character is unique and memorable while also sharing an important quality: determination to succeed against the odds. ... For all of the people who ever loved someone enough to make painful sacrifices to secure their future."



Leanne Toshiko Simpson's *Never Been Better* (p. 25) – a hilariously offbeat and tender comedy about one bipolar woman's messy search for love – made a big splash this summer! It has been featured in <u>Good Morning America</u>'s spring reading list, <u>Electric Lit</u>'s "books that are rewriting bipolar disorder," <u>Elle Canada</u>'s Asian Heritage Month reading list, <u>Book Riot</u>'s "best romance books with neurodivergent main characters," and <u>The Seattle Times</u>' and <u>The Writers' Trust</u> summer reading list. Toshiko Simpson, who herself lives with bipolar disorder, is a charismatic and creative promoter who has wowed audiences at in-person events in Toronto, Vancouver, New York, and LA, and has been profiled by numerous media outlets including the <u>Toronto Star</u> and <u>She Does the City</u>. Published by HarperCollins in Canada, international rights have been sold in Brazil (Alta Books), Germany (Rowohlt), the Netherlands (April Books), and the US (Putnam/PRH).



You might recognize **Glenn Dixon**'s name from his bestselling memoir *Juliet's Answer*, which sold in ten territories. His new novel *The Infinite Sadness of Small Appliances* has been snapped up by HarperCollins Canada and Atria US for publication in spring 2026. Featuring a Roomba vacuum who christens herself Scout after hearing *To Kill a Mockingbird* read aloud, the charming, crossover speculative/upmarket commercial novel explores how a household of sentient appliances (Watch, Fridge, Volvo) become self-aware, come to understand feelings and finally confront the most profound ethical questions facing their humans. The manuscript will be ready for foreign submission early in 2025.





In other exciting news, on the non-fiction side, our author **Shohini Ghose** was recently named the winner of the Canadian Science Writers and Communicators 2023 Book Award (General category) for *Her Space, Her Time: How Trailblazing Women Scientists Decoded the Hidden Universe* (Canada: Random House; India: Jaico; Korea: YoungJin; Spain: Paidos; World English excl. Canada and India: MIT Press). *Her Space, Her Time* has received widespread praise, such as this from the *Boston Globe*: "Ghose's engaging book... explains complex concepts with clarity, understandable for the non-scientist, and the book is a passionate look at the women who've pushed our understanding forward in space exploration, radioactivity, the splitting of the atom, and subatomic imaging, revealing the crucial role women have played, bringing their achievements to light, and in doing, making a strong case for women's place in science now."


Michael Ignatieff has been awarded the <u>Princess of Asturias Award for Social Sciences</u>. The jury referred to the writer as "an essential reference to navigate our current times of war, political polarization and threats to freedom." Ignatieff's most recent book, *On Consolation: Finding Solace in Dark Times*, has sold in sixteen territories including Canada (Random House/PRH), Czech Republic (Kalich), Denmark (Kristeligt Dagblads Forlag), France (Éditions Saint Simon), Germany (Ullstein), Italy (Vita e Pensiero), Korea (Kachi Books), Netherlands (Cossee), Poland (Wydawnictwo Nieoczywiste), Romania (Trei), Serbia (Kontrast), Spain (Taurus/PRH), Taiwan (Business Today Publisher), Thailand (Kobfai), the UK (Picador/Macmillan), and the US (Holt/Macmillan).

Hilary Weston Prize-winning author and transnational/transracial adoptee **Jenny Heijun Wills** is having a very busy autumn, promoting her new book at numerous literary festivals, appearing on a variety of flagship television and radio shows, and being profiled by major media. *Everything and Nothing At All* (p. 38) is a collection of brilliant, piercing, breathtaking personal essays on family, beauty, identity, language and belonging – as well as the grey zones that exist between and beyond these notions of self. The wonderful Kyo Maclear, author of *Unearthing*, said it best: "Defiantly wise. Unbeautifully beautiful. Capaciously loving. Mutinous." With high praise like this, we can see why Wills' collection was just shortlisted for the 2024 Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Nonfiction! The jury praised her "elegant prose" and the "richly decorated and incisive essays" that altogether "weave a rich and complex tapestry of



identity, belonging, and rejection..." This marks Wills' second Writers' Trust Awards recognition, having won this same category for her memoir, *Older Sister. Not Necessarily Related.* Stay tuned for the award winner announcement in November, and in the meantime for media and festival updates!





Dean Jobb's A Gentleman and a Thief went straight to the Barnes and Noble, Globe & Mail, and Toronto Star bestseller lists upon publication, and has been garnering tremendous acclaim: The New York Times proclaimed it an Editors' Choice and called it "delectably entertaining... [Jobb] seems incapable of penning a dull moment," and Publishers Weekly in its starred review said, "A top-shelf work of true crime... Jobb tells Barry's tale with both rigor and pathos, painting a tender portrait of a crook who was never fearsome... This is liable to steal readers' hearts." HarperCollins bought Canadian rights and Azbooka acquired it for Russia; Algonquin Books holds all other rights.

In addition to these many literary successes, we are also increasingly active in securing film, television and stage deals for our talented clients. We have recently optioned a number of properties, including **Don Gillmor**'s *Breaking and Entering* to Blink 49 Northern Productions, **Jillian Horton**'s *We Are All Perfectly Fine* to BentFrame, **Thomas King**'s *Sufferance* to Makwa Creative, **Dennis Lee**'s *Alligator Pie* to Soulpepper Theatre, and **Anna Porter**'s *Gull Island* to Julijette Inc. The stage adaptation of **Mark Sakamoto**'s book, *Forgiveness*, has recently been chosen as part of <u>Stratford Festival</u>'s 2025 season lineup.

Finally, we are thrilled to report that the multi-award-winning stage adaptation of *Life of Pi* by **Yann Martel** will be starting its ninemonth US tour in December, following a 44-week UK tour (and its runs in the West End and on Broadway). Currently on stage in Toronto, the show will be heading to Abu Dhabi and Mumbai in December, and then to mainland China and Taiwan in April.






On New Year's Eve, a pair of addicts robs a string of high-end parties in order to fund their own recovery. A recently separated woman relocates to a small northern town, where she receives a life-changing visitation, and a Russian hitman, suffering from a mysterious lung ailment, retrieves long-buried memories of his past. In the nineteenth century, a disparate group of women coalesce in the attempt to aid a young girl in her escape from a hospital for the insane. These are but some of the remarkable characters who populate these stories, all of them grappling with conflicts ranging from mundane to extraordinary. Caroline Adderson's *A Way to Be Happy* considers what it means to find happiness – and how often it comes through the grace of others.



CAROLINE ADDERSON is the author of five novels and two collections of short stories, as well as many books for young readers. Published internationally, her work has received numerous award nominations, including for the *Sunday Times* EFG Short Story Award, the Dublin Literary Award, two Commonwealth Writers' Prizes, the Governor General's Literary Award, the Rogers

Writers' Trust Fiction Prize and the Giller Prize. Winner of three BC Book Prizes and three CBC Literary Prizes, Adderson was also the recipient of the Marian Engel Award for mid-career achievement. She teaches in the Writing and Publishing Program at SFU and is the Program Director of the Writing Studio at the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity.

A man arrives on a foreign shore. His expedition holds promise and he has high hopes. He strives mightily. It all goes wrong. He has much he could say about that, but his story is lost – until another man arrives on another foreign shore, he too with high hopes.

Psoas of Midea is a goatherd's son who leaves his wife and children behind in order to help Menelaus get his beautiful wife back. 


A Scottish woman has moved across the ocean, to a grubby, overpriced apartment in a town deep in the Canadian mountains, to be with a man. To stop herself from running away, for a year she devises weekly projects to keep herself in one place. Taking lessons from ascetics and anchoresses, adventurers and artists, she seeks to make her small world big and the familiar unfamiliar. She tries to accept the undesirable parts of her life – the sound of trains rattling the windows in the night, the bathroom mould, the bites of the mosquitoes in summer, her desultory online job. She thinks if she can just find a way of loving all that, she will accept her fate of living far from family and friends, four thousand miles across the sea.

The projects are varied, and they often break down amid bouts of homesickness. Set in Canada and Scotland, interspersed with beautifully curated black and white photographs, and rich in atmosphere like an old tapestry woven through with the strange, bright threads of these times, *Hovel* is an act of foraging – a fusion of lived moments and imagined ones that brings readers on a fresh trip through the instants that define us humans, and as beings.





Mark Bourrie CROSSES IN THE SKY

Jean de Brébeuf and the Destruction of Huronia

In the 1640s, fundamentalist Christianity collided with Indigenous culture in the Great Lakes region of North America. Jean de Brébeuf, an obsessed French Jesuit with a dark mystical side, aimed to turn the Huron nation into a Jesuit-run country, and the Hurons, rich corngrowing traders, into a European peasant people.

Brébeuf brought intense zeal to his mission. The French also brought lethal diseases. Brébeuf tried to use the epidemics to save Huron souls but was often thwarted by healers who fought to preserve the religion and culture of their country. Racked by terrible visions, he decided the blood of martyrs was needed. His blind faith sometimes led him into stupid arrogance that alienated many. Eventually, the Huron leadership put a price on his head, and he had to leave. Frequently hallucinating, he now believed Satan and his devils lived in the earthly form of Hurons who opposed him.


His colleagues managed to save the mission and, within a few years, the Hurons were divided between Christian converts and traditional Hurons. As the rift reached a peak, Brébeuf returned, but in 1649, as Huronia collapsed socially, politically and militarily, he was tortured to death by Huron adoptees of the Iroquois.

The story is a microcosm of North American, indeed much of world history: a proud, prosperous nation targeted for a colonial project led by a man sure he knew a better way of life. In the end, he and his colleagues brought epidemic, war and dependence. The complex, driven man who brought this misery was made a saint by the Catholic Church in 1928. Every year, hundreds of thousands visit his mission site, Sainte-Marie among the Hurons, and pray to his skull. Heavily fictionalized versions of Brébeuf's life exist. But this intense and strange story is even more intriguing than the fiction.



MARK BOURRIE is a historian, lawyer and author of many books. *Bush Runner* was the winner of the 2020 RBC Taylor Prize. Before studying law, Mark earned a PhD in History from the University of Ottawa.





Kate Gies IT MUST BE BEAUTIFUL TO BE FINISHED

A Memoir of My Body

Sometimes fixing the problem is the problem.

When Kate Gies was four years old, a plastic surgeon pressed a synthetic ear to the right side of her head and pulled out a mirror. He told her he could make her "whole" – could make her "right" – and she believed him. From the age of four to thirteen, she underwent fifteen surgeries, including skin and bone grafts, to craft the appearance of an outer ear. Many of the surgeries failed, leaving permanent damage to her body.

Written in short, lyrical vignettes, *It Must Be Beautiful to Be Finished* is the story of a "disfigured" body scrutinized, pathologized, and even weaponized. It details the physical and psychic trauma of medical intervention, and its effects on Gies' burgeoning sense of self as a child needing to be fixed – and later, as a teenaged girl and adult navigating the complex expectations and dangers of being a woman. Put simply, this book will punch readers in the gut. Gies does not hold back; she is unflinching in her telling, and the result is a memoir that is beautiful, sad, shocking, and at times truly horrifying.

The book questions our culture's desire to define a person's appearance as a medical necessity and highlights the lengths our society will go to discipline and "normalize" a body. It is the story of a girl desperately trying to have a body that makes her acceptable, and of a woman learning to own a body she never felt was hers to define. In an age of speaking out about the abuse of marginalized bodies, this memoir takes a hard look at the medical system's role in body oppression and trauma.



KATE GIES is a writing professor at George Brown College in Toronto. She was a participant in the Iowa Writers' Summer Workshop and was a finalist for the CBC Nonfiction Prize. Her essay "Foreign Bodies" (excerpted from *It Must Be Beautiful to Be Finished*) is included in the 2024 *Best Canadian Essays* anthology by Biblioasis.



On occasion, he is informed and reassured and protected, and prepared for what will come next.

Why Me? is a propulsive first-hand tale to sit between Pulitzer Prize winner John Mack's Abduction, in print since 1994, and astrophysicist Adam Frank's The Little Book of Aliens.

A Mother, a Forest, and Wild Grief

Collective anxiety: we know it well. COVID-19 and the ongoing climate crisis have underscored how our current political and economic systems have neglected the relationships between humans, our environment, and our mental health. As the wheels of capitalism ground to a halt during the pandemic, many of us sought out new ways of being in relation to each other and to our environment, and found that nature provided both solace and inspiration.

Can forests be a model for future social structures? Can capitalism's hold on our extractive processes on the planet be replaced by "tree thinking," and lead us to reconsider what it means to be a part of nature? Drawing her central image from a tree in the final stages of its life, McWatt immerses herself into the prevailing contemporary moment to unpack ideas like "weathering" and "plant consciousness," searching for signs of the kind of deeper understanding and healing that may propel us into imaginative solutions to our global crisis.


Intersecting with this political examination is McWatt's account of helping care for her mother with dementia, which she braids with her mother's personal history of loss. She considers how the universal experience of grief might help us reformulate how we live together, and lead us towards answers to "What now?" In the process, *The Snag* plants the seed of a crucial idea: that discovering what lies at the intersection of trees and spiritual practices might ease our collective anxiety and open us to a future of community and cooperation.



TESSA MCWATT is the author of seven novels and two books for young people. Her first book of non-fiction *Shame On Me: An Anatomy of Race and Belonging* won the Eccles British Library Award and the Bocas Prize for Caribbean Literature, and was shortlisted for the Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Nonfiction and the Governor General's Literary Award. Her latest novel, *The*

Snow Line, was shortlisted for the Volcano Prize. She is also a librettist and Professor of Creative Writing at the University of East Anglia. 

"If I kept walking," Alpha remembers thinking, "I could tell my story."

Nkuranga emigrated to Canada more than a decade later. She now works with women and children who face abuse and homelessness. In *Born to Walk*, she tells a remarkable story of resistance and survival.



ALPHA NKURANGA fled her village as an eight-year-old during the Rwandan Civil War of 1994 and subsequently lived in refugee camps in Tanzania and Uganda, where she overcame the odds to graduate high school and attend university. She came to Canada as a refugee in 2010 and currently lives in Kitchener, Ontario, where she works for Women's Crisis Services of Waterloo Region.


While Phan grew up, the restaurant was there – the most stalwart and suffocating member of her family. For decades, it's been both their crowning achievement and the origin of so much of their pain and suffering: screaming matches complete with smashed dishes, bodies worn down by ever-spreading arthritis, and tenuous relationships where they love one another deeply without ever really knowing each other.

In Restaurant Kid, Phan seeks to examine the way her life has been shaped by the rigid boxes placed around her. She had to be a good daughter, never asking questions, always being grateful. She had to be a "real Canadian," watching hockey and speaking English so flawlessly that her tongue has since forgotten how to contort around Cantonese tones. As the only Chinese girl at school, she had to alternate between being the Asian sidekick, geek, or slut, depending on whose gaze was on her.

Now, 31 years after their restaurant first opened, Phan's parents are cautiously talking about retirement. As an adult restaurant kid, Phan's good daughter role demands something new of her – a chance to get to know her parents on the trip of a lifetime.

Bringing to lyric life the prism of growing up in a "third culture," Rachel Phan has crafted a vibrant new narrative of growing up, the strength and foibles of family, and how we come to understand ourselves.

How I Learned to Live With Anxiety

From the outside, David A. Robertson looks as if he has it all together – a loving family, a successful career as an author, and a platform to promote Indigenous perspectives, cultures and concerns. But what we see on the outside rarely reveals what is happening inside. Robertson lives with "little monsters": chronic, debilitating health anxiety and panic attacks accompanied, at times, by depression. During the worst periods, he finds getting out of bed to walk down the hall an insurmountable task. During the better times, he wrestles with the compulsion to scan his body for that sure sign of a dire health crisis.

In All the Little Monsters, Robertson reveals what it's like to live inside his mind and his body and describes the toll his mental health challenges have taken on him and his family, and how he has learned to put one foot in front of the other and to get back up when he stumbles. He also writes about the tools that have helped him carry on, including community, therapy, medication, and the simple question he asks himself on repeat: What if everything will be okay?


In candidly sharing his personal story and showing that he can be well even if he can't be "cured," Robertson hopes to help others on their own mental health journeys.

Leanne Betasamosake Simpson THEORY OF WATER

Nishnaabe Maps to the Times Ahead

For many years, Simpson took solace in skiing – in all kinds of weather, on all kinds of snow across all kinds of terrain. As she skied on this path against the backdrop of uncertainty, environmental devastation, rising authoritarianism and ongoing social injustice, her mind turned to the water in the creek and an elemental question: What might it mean to truly listen to water? To know water? To exist with and alongside water? So began a quest to understand her people's historical, cultural, and ongoing interactions with water in all its forms (ice, snow, rain, perspiration, breath). Pulling together these threads, she began to see how a "Theory of Water" might suggest a radical rethinking of relationships between beings and forces in the world today.

In this inventive work, Simpson draws on Nishnaabeg origin stories and her own deep thinking while weaving the work of influential writers and artists alongside her personal memories and experience – and in doing so, reimagines water as a catalyst for radical transformation, capable of birthing a new world.

Theory of Water is a resonant and brilliant exploration of an intricate, multi-layered relationship with the most abundant element on our planet – one that is shaping our present even as it demands a radical rethinking of how we might achieve a just future.



LEANNE BETASAMOSAKE SIMPSON is a

renowned Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg scholar, author of eight books, and artist, who has been widely recognized as one of the most compelling Indigenous voices of her generation. Her novel *Noopiming* was a finalist for the Governor General's Literary Award and Dublin Literary Award, and *This Accident of Being Lost* was a finalist

for the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize and the Trillium Book Award. Her collaboration with Robyn Maynard, *Rehearsals for Living*, was praised by Naomi Klein as "a beacon of a book." She is working on a companion novel to *Noopiming*, called *The Breathing Lands*, that will be published by Knopf Canada in Spring 2026.

From Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize-winning author Jenny Heijun Wills, reflections on ambiguity, stereotypes about queer Asian diasporic women, and how she might exist in the in-between when the world so desperately wants her to fit its image of what she should be.

As an adoptee, Wills navigates the in-betweenness of race and ethnicity. As an Asian pan-polyam femme, she occupies a liminal space between family and "freedom," queerness heteronormativity, monogamy and a constellation of love. As a person who self-harms to cope with mental illness, she balances wanting to be beautiful and making herself ugly, preening in the limelight while daily wishing her body would disappear. As a parent with a lifelong eating disorder, her love language is to feed, but she herself refuses to consume love; she is both culturally consumed and consumes culture to learn how to be what society expects of her. In these devastating, illuminating, and beautifully crafted essays, Wills probes personal grey zones, ambiguities, and excesses to consider how to claim her space in the in-between when the world so desperately wants her to be one thing or another.



JENNY HEIJUN WILLS was born in Seoul, South Korea, raised in Southern Ontario, Canada, and currently lives in Winnipeg, Manitoba. She is the author of Older Sister. Not Necessarily Related.: A Memoir, which received the 2019 Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Nonfiction and the 2020 Eileen McTavish Sykes Award for Best First Book. She is a professor of English at the University of Winnipeg.
